WORD FROM OUR CHAIR

A team of four veterinarians and four veterinary nurses was recruited to carry out our third field clinic for 2024 and our second to the Kingdom of Tonga. The team members came from various parts of New Zealand and Australia, with all except two members experiencing Tongatapu for the first time.



Helen Roberts, who led the team, reported extensive working hours tackling particularly challenging cases, including a dog needing surgery after a machete incident and several cases suffering from poisoning and parvovirus.

Due to the demanding workload, the team had limited opportunity to explore Tonga, but they returned to New Zealand with the satisfaction of having made a significant difference in the health and welfare of many animals, despite numerous obstacles.

SPAW's protocols ensure that young canine patients are vaccinated against the deadly parvovirus and cats are vaccinated against cat flu, additionally all animals take home pain medications and two months of parasite care to see them flea and worm free until our next visit.

Franz, Deb, and Little Italy provided meals and pizza for the team and the local community arrived with coconuts and fruit for the volunteers, these kind gestures make the experience so much nicer for volunteers.

We are very pleased to report that 407 animals received care under the experienced SPAW team and we now look forward to more great work during the next SPAW clinics taking place in October and December.

We express our heartfelt thanks to Helen, Ashlin, Holly, Jade, Alex, Tania, Belinda and Bubbles, who faced considerable animal welfare & logistical challenges during their week-long volunteer excursion. Our gratitude extends to MAFFF, TAWs, our Premium Partner Zoetis NZ, and the many businesses and individuals who contributed to the success of this clinic.
